


Thank you to everyone who baked and brought cakes to share, we had a

"We're not competing with main-stream cinemas as we want to offer an affordable and sociable alternative without compromising on the quality (or size) of our film screenings! We think everyone should have access to the enjoyment great films can bring and even better if they can walk round the corner to do so with friends and family. As well as a relaxed atmosphere and reasonably priced drinks and snacks, we make sure there's time to chat to your friends before the film and we have an interval, like cinemas used to. There's crafting and colouring at our kids events for restless little ones, then quizzes and music in the evenings to keep the big kids entertained!

Stockton on the Forest Parish Council News

We would like to start by saying "thank you and goodbye" to Alan Piper as he leaves the Parish Council and "welcome" to new member Roger Wood.

During the past year we have maintained and inspected play area, litter bins, benches, salt bins and bus shelters throughout the parish and had some interesting discussions on dog poo, pot holes and fracking.

We have awarded grants to the church for £400 to maintain the grounds, the Village Hall £300 for new tables and the cricket club £500 towards a new mower

Planning: It's been a relatively quiet year with only 13 planning consultations discussed.

Improvements have been made to the footpath near Tom's shop, the footpath outside the hospital and a new bus shelter near The Fox with support from grants from our City Councillors.

We now have a working streetlight outside the Fox Inn and the road at the end of the Hollies has been finished with yellow lines repainted outside the school.

Hopgrove speed management: The road signs have gone back to their original position after a trial period - speeding still an issue on Hopgrove Lane South but also through the village and down Stockton Lane towards York. Police speed vehicles are regularly in the village.

Improvements to the junction of Hopgrove Lane South with Malton Road are being looked into.

A suggestion of linking the village and Hopgrove footpaths has been currently ruled out due to the potential high costs.

The Yorkshire Marathon ran again on Sun 20th Oct 2019. We would appreciate any comments, good and bad, from parishioners as to its impact on the village.

Our City of York Ward Councillors are Tony Fisher, newly elected and Paul Doughty who was reelected.

Holy Trinity Church - Stockton church is alive and kicking!

The church continues to try to be a welcoming presence in the village community.

We are happy that many parents and others join us for **Coffee and Croissants** on Monday mornings in term time (8.45-10am) and we have a regular group who come to the **Monthly Afternoon Tea** (usually the third Tuesday 2-4pm see notice boards for details).

Coffee mornings are held on the second Saturday of each month 10am-12noon. Several times a year this will be combined with a family activity morning like that held to celebrate Harvest Festival this month.

As well as food, they provide clothes, a place to wash, and friendship. As Nick is soon to turn 50 himself, it seemed the right challenge to run the 50 miles home (53.5 as it turned out)!

With a lot of the sponsorship coming from parishioners, who enjoy watching him suffer, over **£3000** was raised. Thank you to everyone who was able to support him.

Stockton Hall Hospital


This year has been a busy one for Stockton Hall in terms of work in the local community. Patients at Stockton Hall have been helping regularly to keep the village clean by doing a number of litter picks throughout the year. Local residents are always welcome to join us when these take place, the more hands the merrier!

Patients have also been carrying out volunteer work at Beetle Bank Farm just up the road where they have been helping to clean out animals and are currently helping with the design and development of a sensory garden for the farm's visitors.

Holy Trinity Church has now also become a place where our patients are increasing their skills by helping to keep it clean and the grounds maintained – we have only just started this but hope it becomes an ongoing venture!

We have also held a variety of charity events including coffee mornings for both the Alzheimer's society and Macmillan.





I was born in 1937 in Leeds and grew up in a back to back house with two older brothers and an outside shared toilet.

I worked as an architect in Leeds until 1972 when I transferred to work in York and bought a house in Stockton on the Forest, it was one of the new houses on Kingsmoor Road and cost £6500. I thought this might do for 5 years or so and here I am still in the same house nearly 50 years later!


My first introduction to village society life came a couple of years later when I was invited to help with the Drama group. Like most people I only wanted to help back stage; building, painting and moving scenery. I was quite creative and painted - so I'm told - some beautiful and brilliant backdrops for the plays and pantomimes. After much persuading I took my first role on stage as a mad Russian with just one word to say. This lead on to bigger roles, including Hobson in Hobson's Choice, Charles in Blythe Sprit and Scrooge in A Christmas Carol, etc.

Around 1976 I joined the Stockton and Hopgrove Cricket Club; I was a mediocre batsman but managed to con the opposition into believing I was a demon spin bowler. In the early days we didn't have a pitch so played on the Knavesmire. Later on we played on the fields behind Stockton Hall but when it expanded in the late 1980s we were forced to move again and were invited to join in at the recently formed Hopgrove Playing Fields Association alongside the archers and footballers. I joined the playing fields committee, later becoming secretary and landing myself the job of groundskeeper and could be seen cutting the grass and making sure the pitch was up to scratch most Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays in summer. As I got older I switched from playing to umpiring before finally retiring.

In the 1990s the landlord at the Fox Inn set up a Petanque club behind the pub. This became very popular with people like me playing for fun but also as part of the team in the local league. When the land was sold for building in 2008 the club moved to new purpose build terrains at the back of the village hall where you can find them most Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays. I was made president of the club this year when Dick Wright retired.

Along with the drama group and the cricket club I got roped onto the village hall committee by Jill in the early 1990s as the Clerk of Works. I was able to use my skills as an architect to create plans for the new toilets and other works that have been needed. In the early 2000s, after several people stepped down, and being the only man left standing I became chairman of the village hall committee where I still sit today.

In my retirement I have taken up golf, being so fortunate to have a course right on the doorstep, you can find me there a couple of times a week.

You can join up at any of our libraries, **including the Mobile** Library in Stockton, so come along and we will see you there!




























CELEBRATING 50 YEAR

On October 11th 2019 Stockton on the Forest Scout Group will celebrate its Fiftieth Anniversary. In May 1969 the group first opened its doors to the Youth of the village, becoming officially registered with head office in October of that year. The Group first started with a Scout section which at the time catered for children aged 11 to 16. Shortly after opening the Scout Section the group opened its Cub Pack catering for 8 to 11 year olds. The group sadly had to close its doors for Four years from 1996 until September 2000 due to a lack of Adult Leaders. The following year in 2001 the group opened its Beaver Section, which is how the group still stands today.

Over the past fifty years the group has been heavily integrated with the village, working closely with them on many projects. The village always showed its hospitality towards the group by aiding in its fundraising efforts, offering assistance with maintenance issues, just to name a few. The Group took part in the Stockton on the Forest Carnival annually until it ended, with young people dressing up towards the theme and often winning prizes!

Something that will always remain close to the group's heart is the annual remembrance service at the church, the group have always had a presence at this service, with the young people marching in and laying a wreath in honour of those that paid the ultimate sacrifice for our country.



Within Scouting the group has also had many successes, when the new Chief Scout Gold Awards came out in early 2002 Stockton on the Forest had one of the highest number of young people in the district to achieve this award.

Over the fifty years the group have also taken part in several international events, most notably a group trip to visit scouts in Holland and taking park in Euro Jam 2005 in Hyde Park, London, with around 100,000 Scouters coming together from over 65 countries.

In 2007, for the Centenary of Scouting, the group had nine people selected to go to the "One World, One Promise" World Scout Jamboree. While those nine selected were away at the Jamboree in Essex the rest of the group took part in more spectacular centenary celebrations. Beavers and Cubs spent the night in York Minster with the majority of the District, and the Scouts went to London to take part in the "Live07" show held in the O2 Arena. At sunrise on August 1st all of Stockton on the Forests members, no matter which of these events they were at, awoke shortly before sunrise to take part in the UK national event, where 400,000 Scouters all pledged their promises together.

We would like to finish by thanking all of the Leaders, both past and present, as well as the entire village for the support of the group over the past fifty year. As a charity we rely on our volunteers and supporters and without them we would not have been able to make this Fifty Year Celebration.
